Also one of my Sunbeam Alpine club colleagues is ruing the destruction of his car after a distracted speeding driver hit the back of his Alpine after an episode of slow running/poor engine performance and probable fuel startvation - your health and safety is paramount.

Think Safety please! Fire extingusher, seat belts, awareness of other drivers and road conditions, first aid kit.

I have to admit that I have been slow to come out of "winter" with various domestic issues such as a bad knee hindering my ability to work on cars. I have only recently felt capable of starting again. The Super Minx Convertible has been filling the garage with the smell of petrol lately so sorting this was the first priority. After crawling underneath I discovered that the fuel feed pipe was wet and only held into the petrol tank by underseal! I had to drain the tank using my Lidl 12v pump and then make up a new olive joint. I had bought 4 metres of new rubber fuel pipe and fitted that although maybe it wasn't really necessary. I then checked the fuel sender unit but couldn't make the guage work any better. so that's a job for the future.

I then fitted a brand new Weber carburettor loaned to me by Alpine Innovations - and more about that in the Autumn edition - and found another fuel leak on the old Zenith feed pipe. That got fixed with the Weber swap so for the first time I don't smell petrol when entering the garage.

I also completed a few jobs on my Sunbeam and have been making up for lost time with as many car events as I could find. This has included multiple visits to Brooklands to get the most of my annual membership before it expires. I am looking forward to Rootes Heritage Day and the Gerrards Cross midweek meet in August. AN EPIC MINX JOURNEY

71 years ago this month [June 30] my mother set off from Maidenhead to drive 4,000 miles to Baghdad, all in the name of love. Mary was 31, had never been abroad and only recently learned to drive. In the back of her 1948 Hillman Minx saloon, affectionately called Miranda, she had her three children, Roger, Susan (myself) and Bridget, respectively aged seven, five and two.

The reason for this reckless adventure in 1954 was that my father, Billy, was a RAF sergeant who had been posted to a station at Habbaniya, in the deserts of Iraq, ten months previously. The separation had proved unbearable and the couple hatched a secret plan to reunite that they called Operation Magic Carpet. It was spurred by a chronic lack of married quarters at RAF Habbaniya which were awarded on a points system that always eluded Billy, and because 'being together means more to us than anything else in the world'.



The car Mary set off in was a 1185cc side valve Phase II Minx, a small vehicle for such an intrepid journey. She put an old gramophone box filled with toys on the back seat to keep us amused and we headed to Dover to board the night ferry to France, which had only recently progressed from using cranes to the drive-on, drive-off system we all know.

By good fortune she had a brother, Alan, who worked for the AA in London and supplied her with a 72-page route description. Hand-typed, its detail is astonishing, listing the first leg from Dunkirk to Istanbul as precisely 2,163¾ miles. Passing through Brussels, Salzburg, Zagreb, Ankara and Damascus, this came complete with suggested sightseeing stops at cathedrals, castles and mosques, as if we were embarking on an educational grand tour from leafy Berkshire to the timeworn sands of Mesopotamia.

Billy estimated the journey would take around three weeks and cost £40, and he sent lots of advice such as the need to get a GB plate and to pack chewing gum for repairing leaks. 'Put all food that might melt into tins,' he advised, 'and make sure the load on the roof is evenly distributed'.

Mary had little idea of what was in store. 'Do I need a tent for crossing the desert?' she wrote to Billy. 'No, the sand is too soft and there are too many insects,' he replied. 'Instead you'll have to join a convoy of RAF trucks and sleep in your vehicle, as the chaps do.'

At first the drive seemed easy and exciting. In a 22,000 word memoir, Journey to Jordan, that Mary subsequently wrote about this trip, she records with capital letters the excitement of being spoken to in French for the first time. 'I just smiled hopefully and said 'thank you very much'', she noted. I can still remember being horrified at the sight of Belgians eating snails and we all found it great fun to discover the new phenomenon of sleeping under a continental duvet.

As Miranda sped through a West Germany still rebuilding after the Second World War, Mary was deeply impressed by the autobahns and another novelty – the 'lay-by' where we could rest and picnic. En route we met a cavalcade of colourful characters that included several Germans who had been prisoners-of-war in England, a musical troupe with striptease dancers and a former U-Boat commander. 'When he fondly took Bridget on his knee and played with her teddy bear, I found it hard to picture him in his previous grim role,' Mary mused. 'How is it a man can be so kind



yet so cruel?'

During the long drives Mary kept the spirits up by getting everyone to sing 'God Save The Queen' and '(How Much Is That) Doggie In The Window?'. Roger would look out for road signs but we had no idea of the enormity of our journey. Stopping for a break beside a lake near Frankfurt we merrily picked bunches of wildflowers 'to give to Daddy', unaware that he was still thousands of miles away. Meanwhile, when Billy's superiors eventually learned about Mary's ambitious drive, which only came to light after we had reached Stuttgart, he was informed in no uncertain terms by

the Air Officer Commanding that if his family turned up at the base we would all be sent straight back to England 'within 14 days at your expense'.

Money was tight and the problems with Miranda began when she struggled to get up the steep Pötschen Pass near Salzburg. The end result was a three-day repair in a garage in Bad Aussee in which no-one spoke English, which cost £10. Mary kept herself busy by sending postcards. 'I've bought a yodelling record as a souvenir,' she wrote to Billy. 'I wonder if you will hate it?'

Although cautioned not to drive at night or pick up strangers, when we drew near to Belgrade Mary gave a lift to a gaunt, 19 year-old escapee from East Germany. Hans had been living on his wits for the last three years and he now joined us as we travelled though Yugoslavia, then desperately poor with a Communist regime.



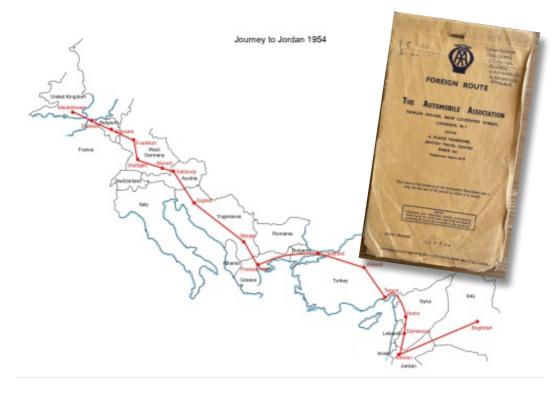
It was here, near Skopje (now in North Macedonia), that Mary's trip took a fateful turn. Literally, as Miranda skidded, veered off a bridge and dropped ten feet into a ditch. I remember tumbling and tumbling in the back seat and my mother having blood all over her face. Bridget was sitting in the front on Hans's lap (no seat belts then) while Roger's greatest calamity (as he subsequently wrote to Billy with great sadness) was that in the mayhem he lost a treasured toy crane that he had been given for his birthday.

The Tisdalls were shaken but survived, and were quickly helped by local villagers. Then, miraculously, a coach carrying 25 French holidaymakers, including several nuns, came over the hill. They agreed to take us back to Skopje where it was discovered that Bridget had a broken leg while Mary required stitches to her face. We feared that Miranda would be quickly stripped, but, in another lucky break, a repair vehicle that had been out on a job passed by and decided to take it into a garage.

Mary went straight to the British Consul, William Maxwell, for assistance. 'A real Scottish gentleman', he and his wife, Olive, were 'kind beyond words', taking our battered quartet into their home for the next four weeks. It proved a sunny interlude in which Roger learned to play cricket with the Consulate staff while Bridget stomped around with her leg in plaster to a backdrop of militia-filled streets and buildings decorated with the Communist hammer-and-sickle.

The rescued Minx was sent for repair with a view to continuing the journey to Baghdad. Given the poor state of the roads ahead, Miranda's propensity to break down and the need to cross 200 miles of uninhabited desert, the British Consul sternly advised against this. With his support, a plan was made to get Billy sent to Yugoslavia to help with the driving but the RAF refused to sanction this.

Then, in yet another unexpected twist, Air Marshall Sir Claude Pelly, Commander-in-Chief Middle



East Air Force, got wind of these events. He admired Mary's plucky attempt to reach her husband which he declared 'shows a spirit only too rare these days'. He immediately sent a signal stating that she is 'like a breath of fresh mountain air coming over the hot desert' with an instruction to 'see that Sgt Tisdall is reunited with his family'.

Billy was quickly posted to RAF Amman, in Jordan, where we would be allowed to stay in local accommodation before progressing to married quarters. After a complex two days of delays and re-routing flying via Istanbul and Beirut, we were eventually reunited as a family in Jerusalem on August 6, 1954, Billy's 36th birthday.

The Tisdalls went on to spend ten months living in a village with Palestinian Arabs before we were finally granted a house at the RAF base. And what happened to Miranda? She was sent back to England but the Rootes Group assessors subsequently declared her a write-off, and the good old AA paid out the insurance claim in full.

AN INVITATION TO BROOKLANDS

Jules Cranwell, a volunteer at Brooklands, has been keeping me informed as to the progress of their 1936 Aero Minx and I have been reporting on it during the last year. It was originally donated to the museum in a very clean and tidy state but unknown working condition and little recent engineering history. I think Jules was designated as the Aero Minx mechanic due to his Sunbeam/ Rootes familiarity — you can regularly see his Alpine at the classic gatherings. When they tried to run it they experienced unpleasant noises and vibrations related to engine speed and it was difficult to turn over. The engine was therefore removed for inspection.

Once out of the car it was apparent that the clutch was in a poor state and it was hoped this was the cause of the vibrations. Remember that I visited their workshop while this work was being carried out having noted that the car was not on display on a previous visit. While the engine was out they also turned it upside down and inspected the bearings discovering that although in excellent shape the clearance on the main bearings was too tight and was the reason for the tightness. They shimmed the end caps so that regulation clearance could be obtained and this solved the tightness problem.



Once back in the car they found that the noises and vibration were still present and so removed the engine again. At this point they realised that no-one had yet taken the flywheel off. When they did so they found that the bolts were only finger tight yet the locking tabs had been turned up – clearly the previous owner had failed to fully torque the bolts during the previous maintenance where it is assumed the bearings had been changed. There was enough movement to cause the flywheel to chatter.

Jules contacted me to say the car was running and did I want to have a drive in it? I couldn't refuse. The museum regularly gives it cars an outing on the main straight for public viewing and I managed to make myself available on the next outing for the Aero Minx.



A small group of cars and bikes were being prepared when I arrived and I was relieved to see the Aero Minx outside and obviously in working condition. Jules gave me a couple of runs in the car which I have to say runs very sweetly. He managed the non-synchro gearbox very well but I noted that the rear suspension didn't particularly handle the weight of two heavy men on some of the worst bumps on the straight and he progressively found a smoother line with each lap. Eventually we managed a lap without getting a boot up the backside.

This is the oldest car I have ever driven (passenger) and it felt surprisingly modern and zippy – albeit with plenty of squeeks, rattles and exhaust noise. The rain held off while I was there but we erected the hood as a test. It normally sits underneath a panel allowing the rear of the car to show a smooth rear-end – a very well thought out design.

I also enjoyed seeing the Rapier Nailton in action. You have to make sure you are not in from of it when it starts as 24 litres and 540 BHP through a 1:1.6 final drive means it hits 40MPH near-immediately. All in all it was a very special morning and thank you to Jules and Brooklands Museum.



A HILLMAN IN THE NETHERLANDS

As a new member I like to introduce myself and my Car: Rosy the Hillman Minx of 1933 which I bought 6 month ago, apart from this I'm used to a couple of Imps, Alpine and a Rapier.

It's a left hand drive car and originally exported and sold in the Netherlands and the only LHD one left according the Dutch Road Office although there are some RHD cars imported later of which I would love to get in contact with their owners if they're reading this...



The car has four gears (no synchro) retained its 6 volts positive earth electric power system, but the newer Zenith 26 VF carburettor and air filter and has the funny trafficators what a charm!

As it is in driveable condition we did some tours with it one nice drive around East Gelre with other pre-war cars this summer and one closeby at Groesbeek when the Liberation Task Force (Itf-hq.com) did the 80th rememberance of the WW2 Market Garden operation driving from Leopoltsburg in Belgium through to Eindhoven, Grave, Groesbeek, Nijmegen, Arnhem and Oosterbeek around the 17th of September.

Here some photo's with Rosy the Minx and Sherman tanks and one with a Diamont T, Churchill Tank on trailer, Impressive stuff! Just a detail: these guys take their tanks all the way from Britain on the ferry and drive on own expense: fuel 9L to 1 Km!

Both trips with the Minx weren't that easy, going to the first one I had a flat rear tyre on the ferry crossing a river, not a problem but I needed to weld the rim as it was rusted through which could be fixed a couple of days before the run, luckily I anticipated trouble as I was unfamiliar with the car. All went fine afterwards.

On the other trip, after we visited the LTF camp at Groesbeek the Minx suddenly got a stuck rear axle, luckily at low speed but in the middle of a junction, just great! Not being able to go forward



or backwards and blocking the LTF convoy! Luckily they didn't mind and unable to help, the scouts diverted their route.

So you see the litle Minx showed its character like the Imps do from time to time;-) The Dutch AA lifted the rear wheels on rollers and put us on a trailer back home. While unloading, the rear wheels suddenly freed up again so next thing is to check the back axle.

Next year we have planned to do the Eleven city run in the Friesland in the north (200Km) www.elfstedenoldtimerrally.nl and I don't like to get stuck or ruin anything.

While I'm at it, if somemone knows any spares for sale like rear axle, gearbox or some nice 6,5 inch chrome nave caps I would love to hear from them...

I saw the ad of that dutch lady wanting a 1185 cc hillman engine in current mag. As I'm living in The Netherlands I tried to call her but the number is wrong, not in use. Can you check if it is the correct number, maybe a typo?

I'm also looking for spares for my 10HP Minx like a gearbox as my 2nd gear is noisy when selected. And I'm looking for 4 hup caps in any condition if possible. Can you make an add for that in Coventry Spires?

Besides I had hoped my story see would be published as I like to get in touch with any continental 10hp owners. (Found an advertisement of one in kleinanzeigen.de which I contacted but no answers yet though...)

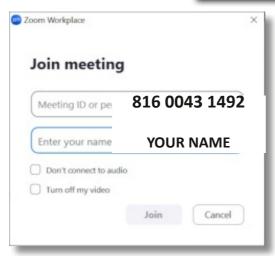

A TRIP TO BEAULIEU

For me there's nothing better than motoring through the New Forest on a bright May morning to attend the Beaulieu Spring Autojumble, the highlight of my year (followed closely by the even bigger Autumn Autojumble).

This year in glorious sunshine there was an added thrill. Two sparkling Hillmans were in prime position to welcome the 13,500 visitors - a gorgeous two-tone Minx fronting a superb display of vintage Sprite caravans celebrating their 75th anniversary, and a beautifully restored Super Minx drawing nostalgia fans to an attraction called We Had One of Those. This display breaks the rules of most museums, actually encouraging visitors to touch and even get behind the wheel to smell the aroma of motors from halcyon days gone by.

Whose idea was this? It turns out the new Chief Executive of the National Motor Museum Jon Murden is an ardent Rootes fan and owns several models himself including the shiny green and white Minx in the field. And the Super Minx Mk3 in the memory exhibition was also his and was donated to a local Hythe charity Mechanix which helps young people train to be mechanics who lovingly restored it and it will later be auctioned for charity. What a brilliant idea.

Clearly impressed with the Autojumble was YouTuber Steph Hoy of 'idriveaclassic' fame (her bubbly report on YouTube is well worth watching), another Hillman fan, from Huddersfield. More interested in Sunbeams were two Sunbeam club members from the USA - Alan Getschke and Eric Gibeaut - who were excited to see the actual Sunbeam 1000hp vehicle that broke the world land speed record of 200 miles an hour almost a century ago at Daytona Beach, Florida. They watched restoration work on the huge vehicle which has two engines one of which runs backwards! Beaulieu aim to take the restored record breaker to Daytona for the centenary of its triumph in 2027.

If all that wasn't enough, a new temporary exhibition celebrates 75 years of Formula 1 racing with nine iconic racing cars lined up and a high-end professional simulator to test your skill around the Silverstone track, with the fastest lap-time every month winning a Scalectrix set. Although there wasn't an obvious Rootes connection (I tried) it was fun all the same. (An add-on ticket for the Formula 1 simulator costs £15 for a 15-minute ride with height and weight restrictions. The temporary exhibition runs until Sunday 2 November). Don't forget Beaulieu International Autojumble is 6-7 September laaaater this year.

WEBER FOR 1600CC IRON HEAD ENGINES?



A friend of mine from the Sunbeam world, Jerome Senn, runs a business (Alpine Innovations) providing custom spares for the Sunbeam Alpine world. One of his successes has been to help develop a modern Weber replacement for the Alloy head 1600cc and 1725cc Alpines. The SAOC orchestrated the development of a new manifold based on a previously unused design but needed a supplier to partner with to handle the many exchanges with Webcon from both a business and technical perspective.

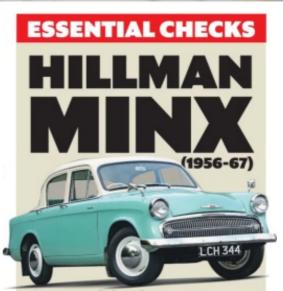
I told him that the Hillman community was crying out for a replacement carburettor for the iron headed Minxes and Super Minxes. How many of us have experienced blocked jets, corrosion and leaks with the Zeniths? In some cases the butterfly shafts become worn and leak air, spoiling the mixture. Jerome recently came back to me with a brand new demonstration downdraught Weber which is intended as a replacement for 1600cc Ford engines. The choke size natches my Zenith and I plan to instal this on my Super Minx convertible as soon as I have completed editing the Summer edition of Coventry Spires. I will report back in the Autumn edition.

My trial will confirm the physical installation requirements and hopefully identify any idle and other jet setups. Please let me know if you are interested in the results and I will update you ahead of publication.

It's one of the cheapest ways into a bona fide Rootes classic. Here's what to look for

CHECK FOR TIRED ENGINES

Any unit will last 100,000 miles if looked after; if the revs drop when you dip the clutch, the thrust washer on the back of the crankshaft has worn, along with the main bearings, necessitating a bottom end rebuild at around £500. Rattling from the front of the engine belies a worn timing chain, tappets out of adjustment or worn tappets and followers; the latter requires a top end rebuild (around £700). Cam followers wear if their oil supply pipe is blocked with swarf. Wear accelerates once the oil supply is restricted and you'll need £250 to replace the rocker shaft and rebush the rockers so budget accordingly when buying.

LOOK CAREFULLY FOR ROT

The steel in the Series V and VI was thinner than previously and poor panel supply has been an issue for years. Valances, wings, bonnets and bootlids are tricky to repair thanks to their compound curves. Check the front valance (including where it meets the front wings), the wings (behind the headlamps and along the bottom), plus the area between the inner and outer wings, floorpans and sills. Fixing the V-shaped cruciform under a convertible is no problem, but advanced rot creates uneven door gaps. Check the base of the B-pillar, the rear wheelarches and spring hangers.

ASSESS THE BRAKES?

Check the front footwells for brake fluid, which indicates a tired master cylinder; just renewing the rubbers isn't effective in the long term so it's best to replace the whole thing for £85. The wheel cylinders can also leak because the bores and pistons pit easily, and they're expensive to replace.

LOOK FOR OIL LEAKS

Leaks at the front of the engine will be from the timing cover, which has a scroll seal. The cover needs a special location tool or it's guaranteed to leak. Also, once the timing chain has worn and stretched, it knocks against the oil feed pipe that keeps it lubricated (to stop it wearing, ironically enough...) accelerating wear. With the oil pipe then knocked out of position, it increases the amount of oil escaping from the timing chain cover. The fix is pretty straightforward, however – replacing the timing chain, tensioner and oil pipe should cost no more than around £40.

PETER SAINTY'S VINTAGE RUNNING

However, the Fourteen went for its annual safety check shortly afterwards, and it was passed fit: driving it home, however, we were forced to the nearside of a narrow road by oncoming traffic, and hit one of the many potholes which infest this area, which induced a nasty case of axle tramp. Fortunately I was travelling slowly and braking to a stop was not difficult (from what I understand of the dynamics, axle tramp is more common at lower speeds). Shortly after that, I picked up a tinkling rattle from under the bonnet which I thought might be the fan coming loose: investigation revealed nothing obvious, so I continued on, but by the time I reached home, the car was leaving a noticeable trail of blue smoke.

The following evening was the VE Day celebrations, for which we had been asked to take the Hillman, two miles away. All set, I tried to select reverse, only to find I could not shift the lever at all. Taking the top off the gearbox revealed that the lever mechanism had moved out of engagement with the car still in gear — reasonably easy to fix but not something which should happen! Anyway, we were mobile again, if slightly late, and it was a lively occasion. By the time we got home, though, the blue smoke had increased and when I reversed the car into the garage, it was some time before it was possible to see anything! Depending on what investigation reveals, and the ease or difficulty of repair, 2025 may not see the Fourteen at many shows....

Hopefully others have more positive experiences and can fly the Vintage Hillman flag at as many events as possible.

BRAKE PIPE TOOL

Years ago (in the 1970's) I replaced all the brake pipes in my Sunbeam Alpine by buying a roll of cunifer pipe and a flaring tool. It was a two part block that clamped the pipe and then created the flare when you screwed in a special mandrel. I recently needed to shorten a pipe and wished I had kept that tool.

I first bought a flaring tool in Lidl for under £10 but discovered it was metric and didn't accommodate my 1960's brake pipe diameter, and worse it only created a simple flare. Brake pipes need to have the bulbous double flare folded back on itself. I found an Ebay listing with the 3/16" tool and two rolls of copper pipe for £30. It was worth a punt as they say especially as I was quoted £50 to make up a single replacement.



The pipe I wanted to replace had originally been installed in a panic when my servo failed and I just needed to bypass it. It was 12" too long and so I created an ugly double loop to use up the extra length – it was all I could do at the time. I finally decided I should rectify the situation after several people had pointed at it and said disapprovingly "what's that?" when I opened my bonnet.

The tool arrived quickly but with no instructions. You have to experiment with tightening the two halves of the block and the position of the pipe making sure the two halves of the block are aligned and that the mandrel I is properly centred in the thread.

I found that the best method was to clamp the pipe in contact with the mandrel with about 6 or 7mm of thread visible. Winding the mandrel in then squishes the end of the pipe into the bulbous

shape. Don't forget to put the brake union on first. So, 10 minutes of experimation and 5 spoiled efforts finally resulted in one satisfactory pipe.

The mandrel has two ends, with the other one creating a simple flare for the female unions. Now, what do I do with 2 rolls of brake pipe?





GOING ELECTRIC (FUEL PUMP)

Ha! I bet you thought this was about converting my Super Minx to be an EV. You are only partially correct. This is all about installing an electric fuel pump. I am sure that I repaired my mechanical fuel pump properly using an overhaul kit from Arrow5 yet fuel supply doubts remained and I wanted to add a belt-and-braces fix by having both an electric and mechanical pumps in the car. No more AA callouts for simple faults please!

I am also wary of the fact that my camshaft may be worn and not fully triggering the mechanical pump, or grit from the tank is causing the mechanical valves to lose their ability to seal fully. I note from a Paul Marshall video that he has seen worn lobes on camshafts. This would cause the fuel flow to be reduced especially as temperature in the engine bay can increase the back-pressure from the float chamber and render the pump ineffective. I have already installed an inline fuel filter which I have to clean regularly so I know a tank clean also needs to be carried out eventually.



I bought a 12V low pressure fuel pump at the NEC and fitted it near the battery. This is also where the inline filter is positioned so the fuel pipe layout is simple. The filter sits in a clip the same size as the one that holds the jack and allows me to pull it out and inspect it easily.

Fuel flows through the filter, then to the electric pump, and then to the mechanical pump - in series. I can even choose to turn off the electric pump if I feel confident in the mechanical one. A trial run showed that there were no leaks from the Zenith so the float chamber valve is handing the pressure (the pump is no more than 4 psi). The pump made a loud clicking noise when I first turned it on but thankfully it went near-silent as soon as it was primed with fuel. The recommendation is to position the pump as low as possible but I chose a spot slightly lower than the carburettor float chamber which is not ideal, but allowable and good enough.

I installed a relay with its own inline fuse in the power circuit as I only had one un-fused tab available at the fuse box. I used an ignition power line from behind the dash where I had already installed a dash cam and USB charger and I installed a switch from that supply to power the relay. I also added a warning light to remind me when the electric fuel pump was engaged. This sits unobtrusively under the dash.

Did it work first time? Of course not! However, the reason was a dirty contact in the main fuse holder. Wiggling the new wire and spraying it with WD40 caused it to spring to life.

This all requires an interesting mix of mechanical and electrical skills and I took my time making sure each step was carried out properly, unlike my hurried and casual workflow from the 1970's!



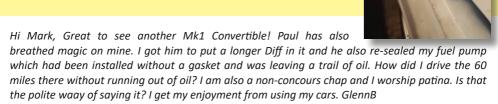
The switch and warning light are positioned discreetly below the dash.

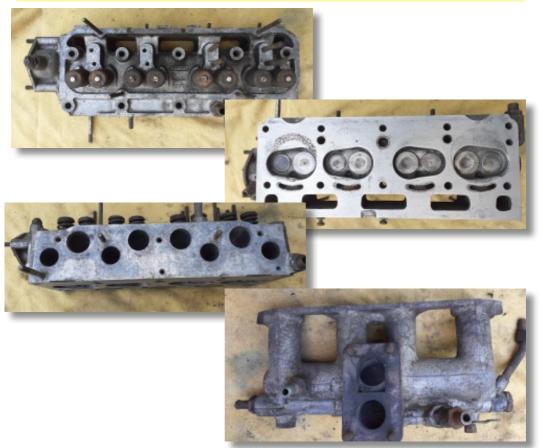
Hi Glenn,

We had one of the first Imps before they were announced and it wasn't even called the Imp! We were all amazed at it as Rootes had sent it down to assess it for saloon car racing. At first there was a whisper that it would be called an AJAX, I don't think that naming it the same as a sink cleaner would have gone down well!! The Competition department was very small at that time right next to the showroom at Mountains Garage on the A21 at Hildenborough and there was hardly enough room for two cars in it. The two main men Les Bennet and Norman Wynn from the original comp dep started work there in I believe 1963 ? and the rest is history!! After talking to Gordon it transpired that he had a cylinder head and a manifold that might be of interest. I asked him to give me some photos so I could possibly help identify it.

Hi Glenn,

I cleaned the head and manifold off to film them and found that the head is actually damaged on number 4 cylinder (picture 5 close up although it is easily repairable). Also number 1 has had something inside it while it was running and marked the head (although that won't affect the running as it's inside the head gasket fire ring) I have seen that many times over the years and it was normally caused by home mechanics taking the carburetor to pieces and misplacing a small ball bearing. Sorry to give the bad news but to me it is a very easy repair as it is easily welded and reshaped. I suppose if it is a hard to find part or not as to whether it's worth putting on the site or not? Anyway it would at least be interesting to find what engine it came off off. I should have got it off the shelf and had a look at it before I sent the message to you. Regards Gordon.



So I am sure it's a regular 1600cc/1725cc Rootes aluminium head and the manifold is for a twin choke downdraught carburettor, so likely from a 1600 or 1725 Singer or Humber. The head just needs skimming and maybe valve seat work. I'm sure it can be saved. It's not a simple swap for an iron head engine but it should be of interest to many - me for example! Ed. (p.s. it might fit my Sunbeam - what do you want for it? ;-))
